Yaama,

I want to start off by thanking all the families for entrusting the staff at Boggabilla Central School to care for and provide quality learning opportunities for your children. Our goal as educators is to guide, develop and support each individual student on their education journey, preparing each on their pathways to further education, employment and adult life as culturally centered, productive and active members of society.

This year has been a year of tremendous change within the education department and the school. Over the past three years the education department has introduced a reform agenda in order to ensure that the education system reflects the changing national and global environment in which we all live. Whilst some people believe that the success of a school can be measured by how many students graduate with a HSC, it is important to remember that what happens in the years leading up to the graduation is critical. At Boggabilla Central School, the journey begins with Playgroup, moving into Preschool, onto the primary years, through the secondary years and finally ending in the senior secondary years when students move onto further education, training or employment. During the small time students are at school, we have a limited opportunity to work with them to establish a foundation for their future lives. I would continue to encourage elders, families and community members to continue working in partnership with the school to make sure students attend school every day so that they can take advantage of the opportunities offered.

Finally, I would like to finish by thanking all the staff, families and community members for your continued support of the students in their endeavours to receive a world class, culturally appropriate education in a safe and innovative teaching and learning environment. I want to wish you all a safe and happy holidays and I look forward to seeing you all next year.

Northern Borders Senior Access Program (NBSA)

Northern Borders Senior Access Program (NBSA) remains a strong part of how we operate in Year 11 and Year 12. The three Year 12 students (Hayden McGrady, Liam McGrady and Quindon McIntosh) graduated and achieved a Higher School Certificate.

The regular 'Get Together' excursions enable our students to get to know their teachers and students from the other three schools outside the video conferencing classroom in a relaxed and welcoming setting.

**NAIDOC Week** in Term 2 was once again a success thanks to the organisation of the staff and great participation of students and community.

Positive Behavior for Learning (PBL) Rewards Days in the middle of each Term has seen more students involved as the year progressed. Students are embracing the concept of PBL and are reaping the rewards.

The Over 85% Attendance Rewards Days at the end of each Term continued to be held this year. In 2016 I hope to report more students attending as the year progresses.

To develop student voice in Secondary the **Student Representative Council** (Daryl Morgan; School Captain, Erol Karkoe; School Vice-Captain, Stanley McGrady and Rexiarna Jarrett) went to a GRIP Leadership Conference in Term 4 in Tamworth. Here they mingled with other schools' SRC students and learnt about the roles and responsibilities of leadership in order to make meaningful contributions across BCS and the wider community. Also in Term 4, a selected group of students participated in the **STEM** (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) Camp. This was an amazing opportunity for these students to explore the possibilities of learning and careers open to them in these areas of industry and innovation.

Just like Primary, 2015 has been a challenging, yet rewarding year. I look forward to working with all students and families in 2016 as we provide the conditions in which all students at BCS learn, foster curiosity and have fun.



The Remote School Attendance Strategy Team consists of four School Attendance Officers (SAOs), Thora Wightman, Lachlan Dennsion, Robert McIntosh and Isabel Talbot and two School Attendance Mentors (SAMs), Jasmine Weldon and Roxanne Duncan. This program is contracted through JoblinkPlus and Malcolm Peckham is Mentor to the School Attendance Officers.

Our job is to work with families to ensure that every Aboriginal student attends school every day. We work as part of the Boggabilla Central School team to improve attendance rates at the school. We support parents/carers to help get their children to school, as well as supporting their children to go to school and to stay at school every day. We reward children for their good attendance. Our ultimate goal is to have every child's attendance at 85% or over by the end of each term. In 2015, we have seen a number of students improve their attendance from 16% in Term 1 to 97% in Term 4.

This year, some new programs were implemented into Boggabilla Central School that is also run by the RSAS Team:

The After School Activities program is run every Tuesday and Thursday from 3:00 pm – 5:00 pm. Activities include and range from sporting games, water activities, visiting local sacred Aboriginal sites and mentoring students.

Night patrol is another program that the School Attendance Officers engage in 3 nights per week from 7:00 pm – 10:00 pm. The program was developed by the Prime Minister and Cabinet and the local Police to help target children that are on the streets at night. The service provided involves picking children up and dropping them home at a reasonable hour.

Big Breakfast Wednesdays are held every Wednesday morning at the Pink House from 8:00 am – 8:45 am. It is Bacon, eggs, Hash Browns, Sausages, Toast, Cereal and Juice. This is another initiative that the RSAS Team is involved in; each time it has been an awesome feed with heaps of students getting involved.

In Term 4 we held two major events with both being a great success. The first event was a Boggabilla Central School Halloween Disco. We had 50+ students attend! We also had prizes for best dressed and best dancer, games were played and we finished off with a delicious Pizza for dinner. The second event was a Basketball/Ball Games Night with 50+ students attending; we had a BBQ dinner, played ball games and let the students have a water balloon fight. Both events were very successful. It was a great pleasure seeing all students networking, having fun and creating new memories.

In 2016 we hope to be working with Boggabilla Central School, the local community and parents/carers and all the students of Boggabilla Central School.

#### Preschool Highlights from 2015





#### This year saw us put into action some

**initiatives** from our Quality Improvement Plan, following an extensive self-assessment schedule. We targeted areas such as programming formats and our outdoor environments this year. Some of these changes included a more visual program for parents, using images in our documents to demonstrate to parents what our environments and activities look like and making our programs easier to follow and understand.

We re-located our garden and compost and worm farm. We developed a new system to store and display garden materials to develop independence and we introduced a herb garden.

We also developed a digging patch and made more space for physical activities and sporting ventures. We also worked on our brick making factory and put in some pallets to create a display areas for dress-ups, a storage wall for tools and a music wall.





We added chooks to our pen as well, after remodelling the pen and developing the chook run.



#### In class...

Within our day to day routines, we established a strong emphasis on developing 'mindfulness' within our classroom and looking at ways children can identify emotions and develop and utilise many strategies to control and regulate these emotions. We established an 'emotional regulation' corner with each child having access to their own book which provided visual prompts for children to access independently. We also developed a smart board notebook presentation for the class to access which provided sessions on Spiderman mediation, relaxation breathing, mindfulness sessions, yoga, rest and relaxation music, prompts and visual cues. Educators guided the class through sessions as necessary.

We attended weekly Primary assemblies, taking turns to present work samples to other classes. We did a great job listening and joining in on the anthem and school song.





Aunty Noelene and Mr.B. ran a 'Celebrating Culture' session each Tuesday, introducing aspects of culture and identity and taught the children Gamilaraay lingo for animal names, body parts and numbers 1-10. Mr.B made many little dictionary support booklets to match our language focus each term. Children were able to take them home at the end of the term and share the lingo with their families.







## Special days...

During term 2 we had a special visit from the Governor of NSW, His Excellency General, The Honourable David Hurley and his wife Mrs Hurley. They both joined with us for a 'celebrating culture' session where Aunty Noelene and Mr B introduced different names for Australian animals in Gamilaraay language. They also watched us play a game of lingo bingo. Before our special guests departed, the children presented them with a small collection of our paper bricks as a gift. It was a very big highlight for us.



We were again successful at the Goondiwindi show, taking out winning positions in the veggie section and have continued to experience success with our second lot of planting this year, growing beans, tomatoes, lettuce, strawberries and some herbs. Our silverbeet continues to flourish as well. We are particularly proud of the children's






efforts in this area, as all our veggies are gown from seed and are looked after daily by the 'Sustainability Soldier' as part of their role.

We participated in the Easter Hat Parade. We made many different designs on our hats, which we were happy to display and parade around with the rest of the primary and our parents.









ANZAC day was a particularly special time for us at preschool. We did a lot of research leading up to the day to discover what it actually signifies. The children did a lot of reading and investigating aspects of life as a soldier, living in trenches, writing home and fighting . They were particularly interested in life in the trenches and explored many images of trench life.



We designed our own medals for the soldiers.



We wrote stories about aspects of a soldiers' life, which we shared at assembly.

Aunty Georgie came in each Monday and taught the children drumming using the Djembe drums. It was one of our highlights.







We participated in the Athletics Carnival—running our Infants carnival in conjunction with the rest of the school. The pre-schoolers did extensive athletic skill sessions as part of their daily obstacle skills, beginning term 1 and continuing right through until the carnival. We developed skills in sprinting, javelin, shot put, discus and long jump, which we were then able to compete in come carnival day.

We were lucky enough to experience some visiting performers to the school. One stand out was

the 'Heidi-Ho' performance. Rylee had a turn on stage and was very confident. We also thoroughly enjoyed the African drumming performer at the school. Many of our pre-schoolers made it on to the stage to join in various aspects of the show including dancing and playing different instruments.







We participated in the Positive Behaviour For Leaning or 'PBL' launch day. The children participated in many activities during the day introducing the key components or values of the program—pride, responsibility, safety and respect.

As part of our transition program this year, we combined with the Kindergarten and Year 1 class for sport each Thursday afternoon. During first term and into term 2 we focused on developing skills in Athletics and we also looked at circuit based sessions developing different sport and fitness skills. For term 3 we focused on tee-ball. We did lots of skills and drills and a modified game of tee-ball. For Term 4 we looked at cricket. We did lots of games and activities to build skills in throwing, catching, fielding and batting a ball. We began early term 4 with French cricket and moved on to a modified version of Australian cricket towards the end of the term.





To celebrate NAIDOC week this year, we held our own celebrations at Boggabilla, and got involved in numerous games, activities and experiences to celebrate aspects of local Aboriginal culture. We also attended the celebrations at Toomelah School. We cooked johnny cakes, threaded our own jewellery, painted boomerangs, engaged in language classes and listened to dreaming stories.


























































# Year 2/3/4





### Stage 5 and 6





### Stage 4



Mixed media works by Deborah McGrady (top left), Daniel Jarrett (top right), Darren Duncan (bottom left) and Dutch Binge (bottom right).





Drawing was the theme for Term 3. Students experimented with various drawing materials including charcoal, watercolour, inks and a variety of pencils. Howard Arkley and Abbey McCulloch were the two artists students learnt about. They created a drawing based on the work of one of these artists.

Term 4, students have learnt about 'Still Life', studying the artworks of Margaret Preston and Robert Campbell Jr.

Although the year 9-10 class is small group, the students have achieved a lot this year. We started the year with printmaking and students created prints using lino block techniques. - Research and Inquiry Methods: Local Community Case Study



# English

### **STAGE 4 ENGLISH**

This year has been very busy in the Stage 4 English classroom. Students have been studying storytelling techniques in various types of media. We began the year with an overview of how stories are told and the different forms that they can take. During Term 2, we learnt about how authors and illustrators work together to tell stories through comics and cartoons. Students even had the opportunity to create their own comic strip based on a story they were familiar with.

Term 3 saw us delve into the world of picture books. We studied a book called Fox by Margaret Wild and Ron Brooks. Students' learnt to identify language features in the book and explain the effect they had on the reader.

This term we have been looking at how plays tell stories using drama, music and dance. Students' have really enjoyed taking on different character roles and developing their speaking skills.

One lesson per week, for the past three terms, has been devoted to explicit literacy skills lessons. The focus of these lessons has been on grammar and punctuation skills. At the beginning of this term I sat down with each student and explained to them where they sat on the literacy continuum. In a nutshell, the literacy continuum is a list of skills that students should be able to demonstrate at particular stages of their schooling. Students then set goals that they wanted to achieve in the areas of writing and speaking. It was very exciting to see the motivation that this gave students to work harder and improve their literacy skills.

I am very proud of the growth that students have shown this year, particularly in writing. The selfconfidence they have gained this year in English lessons has been a pleasure to watch.














### **STAGE 5 AND 6 ENGLISH**

The last 4 months has been a whirlwind for me. I became a teacher at Boggabilla Central School and have taken Stage 5 (Years 9 and 10) and Stage 6 (Years 11 and 12) English classes. The students are a unique bunch and I love the mix of characters in the classroom and the playground.


In Stage 5, they learned about Anh Do prior to my arrival. He is a Vietnamese Australian comedian and the text they studied was The Happiest Refugee. It is a memoir of his life as a refugee, his family's struggle on their journey to Australia, and his beginnings as a comedian.

In my time at the helm, Stage 5 English has focused on film and poetry study. In term 3 we viewed and analysed Yolngu Boy, with students required to write a film review for their assessment task. Yolngu Boy is a film of three Aboriginal boys who have to deal with Western and Aboriginal influences and expectations. Furthermore, they also go through changes and face the struggles that all teenagers do, and to add to this, one of the youths is searching for his father who does not know that he even exists.

This term has been all about poetry. As a school it was decided that a particular poet would be studied. Her name is Oodgeroo Noonuccal, otherwise known as Kath Walker. She is a woman who grew up on North Stradbroke island and lived through many historic decisions in Aboriginal history. In fact, through her poetry she was able to influence the thoughts and ideas of many Australians which no doubt influenced the 1962 and 1967 referendums. Oodgeroo Noonuccal's poetry was chosen in an effort to allow our students to relate to the material but also learn about their history. Common themes in the poetry include the relationship between humans and nature and the treatment and plight of Aboriginal Australians.


In Stage 6, we have had one student complete his Higher School Certificate and two students beginning theirs. A HSC is not easy to obtain so those who do achieve it should be proud of themselves. Currently, Stage 6 are completing their Area of Study, which is based on the concept of discovery. Their set text is the film Life of Pi. As they steadily work through and analyse the film, their assessment task involves finding related text that also involve discoveries. This allows the students to study the subject by including interests of their own. From experience I know that there is nothing better to get someone motivated than relating in-class material to something you like.

### STAGE 6 VET CONSTRUCTION

A big thank you to Collin Davis from the New England TAFE who taught year 11 and 12 construction for most of the year. The students attempted several practical and theory assessment tasks. One of the students' major tasks was the construction of a large chair. As you can see from the below photo the quality of the project was really good. The year 12 students in term four were also starting to repair a seat that the students sit on around the school. This involved taking off slats, running them through a thicknesser and sanding them back with course and medium sandpaper using a belt sander. The timber will be finished with decking oil and assembled using galvanised bolts. Also, the two year 12 students are completing theory work books for VET construction.























### STAGE 5 HISTORY

In History this year students have learnt about the changing rights and freedoms of Aboriginals and migrant groups. The content in these topics is important for these children to know as it outlines their history and the current composition of Australia. It is also vital that they understand how Australia arrived at its current state in order to be active political and social citizens for the rest of their lives. Topics in these units are of great interest to me and I hope I have passed this passion on in abundance. During the Aboriginal part of the unit, students learned about events such as the 1938 Day of Mourning, the stolen generations and the national apology. Furthermore, the Aboriginal Cricket Team of 1868 was covered.

Did you know that the Aboriginal Cricket Team of 1868 was the first sporting team to represent Australia overseas on tour? I made the point to my students that this is quite ironic as indigenous peoples of this country were representing a country who treated them like second rate citizens. In fact, following their tour the team were not allowed to play again as the government restricted their movement within Australia.

The changing rights and freedoms topic also included migrant populations. Migrants have made significant changes to our country and it is important that these be acknowledged. These changes are still occurring today with the influx of Syrian refugees, and as a country we must learn how to live in harmony with one another. I for one am not complaining about Australia's migrant history, just look at all the different types of food we now have!

### Yina Murrumali Girls Healing Group









Many working models and practical assignments were successfully completed by our science students. Stage 5 students, on the other hand, have learned about the structural and chemical characteristics of atoms, ions and molecules of some chemicals. They also investigated the human body and its ability to interact with its environment, basic genetics and DNA structure.




















In term 3, stage 4, 5 and 6 students conducted a series of experiments and observed the spectrum of light and the behaviour of light based on the theme for this year's National Science Week activities: Making waves – the science of light. The experiments demonstrated that science is fun and applicable to many areas of everyday life.

Senior Science students have explored a wide variety of topics that include importance of biomaterials and its uses in medicine, how chemicals in medicine enable the human body to fight disease causing microbes, the chemistry involved in a wide variety of everyday consumer products through various assessment tasks and assignments.











Mid Term 4, our Year 8 students sat for the Validation of Assessment 4 Learning & Individual Development Test (VALID). This is a Science Multimedia assessment that allows students to challenge themselves. Questions are aligned with the Australian National Curriculum and test student's critical thinking and problem solving as well as their science knowledge. From the results, we will be able to concentrate on particular areas to help our students in their science knowledge in their everyday life.

This year we had three students sit for the HSC Senior Science Exam and we have high hopes for their results.










































## Sydney Boys High Cultural Exchange




Personal Development, Health and Physical Education


### Stage 5 PDHPE
