This has given students the opportunity to learn and enrich their lives with their Culture on a weekly basis.

It is amazing how much has been achieved in 2016 by students, staff and community members. The achievements extend from a successful NAIDOC Day, to Yarn Up being implemented back into the school, to celebrating national event days such as Sorry Day, Harmony Day and White Ribbon Day. In Term 4, we were lucky enough to get a visit from the Education Minister the Hon. Adrian Piccoli and his entourage. This event was very important and special to staff and students, as this was the first time in many years that the local community have witnessed students of Boggabilla Central School perform traditional Aboriginal dance. It was a great moment.

Boggabilla Central School now has their own Cultural classroom. It has been fitted with bright, funky and fabulous furniture. Ellenore Binge has painted a magnificent mural on the wall as well. The cultural room will slowly be updated with local history and it will be a memorabilia place where students, community and staff can come and learn about Boggabilla and Toomelah and the local Aboriginal history.

In Term 4, a new initiative was implemented. 'Hooked on School' was an attendance strategy to encourage our secondary students to attend school regularly and on time. Furthermore, it is a great way to encourage the local community to support our students and our school. Each Friday from 1 pm, secondary students, staff and community have participated in 'Hooked on School', when we all head down to the river and go fishing together. There have been some great prizes won, such as sports vouchers, Target vouchers and Shimano Fishing Rods. 'Hooked on School' has been a great success with secondary students and the community. It has been an awesome well-being program for everyone.

It is difficult to identify the highlights of 2016 because there are genuinely so many. Personally I have thoroughly enjoyed watching students learn and enrich their lives with their own Aboriginal culture. I hope that they can look back at 2016 with fondness. I am proud of them all and can't wait to be working with them again in 2017.

PBI.

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) continues to shape our school with our core values of Pride, Respect, Responsibility and Safety. Students are consistently using the language of our expectations and are really starting to put into practice some of the social skills that are being taught through our weekly lessons.

Over the year, we have treated our students to four rewards days to acknowledge their excellent behaviour in the classroom and playground. To be eligible for these rewards days, students needed to have achieved bronze, silver, gold or diamond status. Our first rewards day in Term 1 was a trip to the pool where 11 of our hard working students were treated to pizza and a variety of pool games. In Term 2, we took 25 eligible students into the Goondiwindi theatre to feast on popcorn and watch the movie, 'Angry Birds'. In Term 3 we had 30 students attend the PBL rewards day to watch the movie, 'The Secret Life of Pets'. Lastly, in Term 4, we had an amazing 45 students eligible for the final rewards afternoon at Goondiwindi pool. Congratulations to all of our students who have consistently demonstrated our values of pride, respect, responsibility and safety. It has been fantastic to watch our students steadily collecting their signatures for great behaviour and wearing their bronze, silver and gold badges with pride. A huge thank you to the PBL team for their hard work in continuing to support the teachers and students at Boggabilla Central School as we further implement the PBL system. We look forward to bringing more exciting initiatives to our school in 2017.











EARLY ACTION FOR SUCCESS

The Early Action For Success Program (Phase 1) reaches its conclusion at the end of this year. Early Action for Success is the department's strategy for implementing the NSW government's State Literacy and Numeracy Plan. Its aim has been to improve students' literacy and numeracy skills through a targeted approach in the early years of schooling. At Boggabilla Central School we have achieved very pleasing results from the program yet again this year.

One of the key features of the Early Action for Success program has been the provision of high quality learning to build the capacity of our classroom teachers. Research shows that it is the classroom teacher that has the greatest influence on student learning (Hattie 2012). At Boggabilla Central School we have maintained our commitment to achieving a year's worth of learning for a year's worth of teaching. Meeting every five weeks to analyse student data and plan for high quality, evidence-based teaching and learning programs has ensured the continued achievement of student learning outcomes. This process has also enabled us to respond quickly to

student needs and allocate resources accordingly as well as to determine the professional learning required by our teachers to respond to student needs.

The hard work and dedication of our K-2 teachers and the ongoing commitment and responsibility of our students was platformed at the end of this year with a visit from the Education Minister, Mr Adrian Piccoli, the Secretary of the Department of Education, Mr Mark Scott and a number of other dignitaries. They were particularly impressed by the learning they observed in the K-2 classrooms and the data that reflected the continued growth of our students. One visitor commented, "You could feel the learning happening in the classroom."

In 2017 Boggabilla Central School will embark on Early Action for Success Phase 2, the department's strategy for implementing the NSW government's 2017-2020 Literacy and Numeracy Plan. Their commitment of \$340 million will allow schools like ours to build on the achievements of the first phase of the strategy, to improve students' performance through a targeted approach in the early years.

Attendance has continued to be a major priority and focus this year. We have successfully opened a Learning Centre in conjunction with Prime Minister and Cabinet and Drug Arm. This centre has offered students, who were previously disengaged with their learning, a place to participate in a range of life skill activities in order to re-engage. Congratulations to our fantastic teacher, Ms Gleeson, who has provided an engaging environment for our students, which has improved their attendance rate. We look forward to continuing this strategy in 2017.

On a whole school level, we are starting to make progress with our attendance which is great to see. This is a result of the teachers and staff working closely with students and families in order to support and mentor with attendance. We will continue to support students and families in 2017 to ensure all students attend school and access the education they deserve.

PCYC team up

We have continued our participation in Team Up this year, with the support of Goondiwindi PCYC. On behalf of all the students I would like to thank Sarah and Jason for running the program for us.

Girls Group

This year we continued girl's groups in both secondary and primary. These programs provided experiences for students to develop their self-esteem, confidence, self-identity and leadership skills. We look forward to continuing these great opportunities in 2017.

We cooked johnny cakes, threaded our own jewellery, painted boomerangs, engaged in language classes and listened to dreaming stories.





























Book Week gave us the opportunity to dress up as our favourite character from a story. There were even prizes for most creative dress up and a book lover award. At the end of Term 3, we celebrated Grandparents Day to honour our grandparents. This day allowed children to share a special video with their grandparents and reminded the children of the strength, information and guidance older people can offer.














What a year we have had in the Waraba classroom! Lost teeth, broken bones, new teachers and new support staff.

From the Kitchen Year 9 and 10 Food Technology

Year 7 and 8 Technology (Mandatory) Senior Hospitality

Once again the kitchen has been a busy place throughout the year. Students in the various cookery based subjects have developed their culinary skills and produced some delicious foods.

There were a number of entries in the cookery section of the Goondiwindi Show and our students showed their talent and skill by winning a large number of prizes.

The Year 9-10 Food Technology class started the year looking at foods for special needs. They investigated diet related disorders and their effect on the nutritional needs of individuals. Nutritional requirements at different stages of the lifecycle were also looked at.

Food in Australia was the next topic studied. Students learnt about a range of factors that influence our distinct Australian cuisine with a focus on the contemporary use of bush tucker.

Lastly students have looked at food for special occasions.
















Food design and recipe structure has been the focus for students in the 7-8 Technology (Mandatory) class.

Students have researched, designed and made cupcakes suitable for a child's birthday party. They have also learned to select and use a variety of food preparation techniques and equipment to make a range of dishes. Students have investigated various formats for recipes and created a recipe page suitable for a cookery book using a word processing program. The design process has been followed to guide students to successfully complete projects.

In Hospitality, students have completed some of the mandatory units.

They have used commercial food preparation equipment, produced a variety of food items using various methods of cookery and prepared a number of vegetable, fruit, egg and farinaceous dishes. Students have learned about workplace health and safety, and hygiene requirements when working in a commercial kitchen. The class has prepared food items both individually, as well as part of a kitchen team. They are developing skills in food presentation and have plated food suitable for service in a restaurant.

Practical lessons, in Hospitality, are delivered in the trade training kitchen which is equipped the same as a commercial kitchen. This gives students the opportunity to gain skills in using industry standard equipment before doing work placement.











Lastly, I would like to give special thanks to the staff who have helped out in the kitchen during the year. This helps our students have a more rewarding experience.

English

This year has been another important year of learning in the English classrooms. Students from year 7-12 have been learning about new concepts, developing new skills and working hard to refine old ones.

Stage 4 (Year 7/8)

Developing the literacy skills of stage 4 students has been a continuing priority throughout the year. We have again been running weekly literacy lessons that are targeted to students' abilities and support them in meeting their literacy goals.

At the beginning, middle and end of each term, students' goals are reviewed and new goals are set. To complement these lessons and to assist students in achieving their goals, our English lessons have also focused on different aspects of literacy throughout the year.

We began the year focusing on writing, by learning about different types of writing such as autobiographies and biographies. We continued this focus into Term 2 when we studied famous speeches and what makes a speech powerful. Students had the opportunity to put these skills into practice when they wrote and presented their own speeches.


The second half of the year saw our focus shift to the reading and comprehension aspects of literacy. In Term 3 we studied the novel 'Hatchet' by Gary Paulsen, using some new technology to breathe life into a classic survival story. Students' enjoyed listening and following along to the text of the audiobook, this also enabled them to comprehend the events of the story and analyse in greater depth the themes and issues that were raised. This term it was time to let loose a little and explore the fun topic of Ghosts, ghouls and doppelgangers.

The novel 'Coraline' by Neil Gaiman was our focus for the term and by studying it in depth we were able to analyse the language features and techniques that were used and the influence they have on the reader. We also compared the novel to the graphic novel adaptation by P. Craig Russell and the film directed by Henry Selick.

Stage 5 (Year 9/10)

Stage 5 students started the year studying the topic 'Imagined worlds' in which they explored different genres using texts such as Harry Potter, The Goonies and I, Robot.

Cultural assumptions and identities were challenged in the unit 'Cultural Connectedness', in which students explored their own identities and how cultures are portrayed in different texts. Love and war were on the menu in Term 3 when students explored these themes in texts that were originally books and were later made into movies.











Stage 6 (Year 11/12) English Studies

It has been a busy year of keeping up with classwork, meeting assessment task deadlines and demonstrating diligence. All this has proved challenging for students, and meeting the demands of this senior course has tested their persistence and certainly my patience at times! But after all the viewing of documentaries, analysing of film techniques, deconstructing media articles and writing resumes we made it to the finish line. Our Year 12's leave us with the skills to contribute to the workforce and our Year 11's have already jumped into the second half of the course with gusto.

Stage 6 (Year 11/12) Standard English

Year 12 students have studied three different types of texts during 2016 – the poetry of Oodgeroo Noonuccal, a play - 'Shoe Horn Sonata' and a futuristic novel - 'Feed'. The three terms passed quickly and in no time at all the HSC examination was upon us. The students worked very hard to get assessment tasks and classwork finished on time. All students wrote essays, created films and analysed poems, as well as building up a portfolio of smaller tasks that were then merged into bigger pieces of work. Some of those larger pieces of work were awesome.

ABORIGINAL STUDIES

In Stage 6 Aboriginal Studies this year, students studied the topics Aboriginality and the land, Heritage and Identity and International Comparative study. They explored the relationship of country to peoples, cultures, spirituality, health and lifestyles.

The class has learnt about how the natural environment was used and has changed since the invasion in 1788, what it would have been like for those that made the first contact with one-another and the violence that followed.

By learning about and exploring this history, students have a better understanding of their heritage and identity.

HSIE & GEOGRAPHY

The topics studied were *Interconnections* and *Place and Liveability*. Both classes have enjoyed these topics and contributed wonderful insights into how the world is connected these days and why we are so attracted to living in some places and not others.

As a compulsory section of the VET course all students needed to complete 35 hours per year of work placement.

These students completed 70 hours with Mr McDonald. Vet Primary industries has had a very successful 2016 with students completing many of their units competencies.

MATHEMATICS

During 2016, Maths students have studied a variety of topics, including whole numbers, integers, angle relationships, probability and fractions, decimals and percentages, with a focus being on the real world applications of these topics.

STAGE 4 MUSIC

As an artform, music spreads through society and occupies a significant place in world cultures and in the oral and recorded history of all civilisations. It uses a unique symbol system that uses sound to suggest meaning and send information, and crosses cultural and societal boundaries. Music plays important roles in the social, cultural, aesthetic and spiritual lives of people. At an individual level, music is a medium of personal expression. It enables the sharing of ideas, feelings and experiences.

It allows for the expression of emotion and imagination, the intellect and the exploration of values. Music fosters an understanding of continuity and change, and of the connections between different times and cultures. The nature of musical study also allows students to develop their capacity to manage their own learning, engage in problem-solving, work collaboratively and engage in activity that reflects the real world practice of performers, composers and audiences. The study of music fosters knowledge, understanding and skills that contribute to lifelong processes of learning and to the appreciation and enjoyment of music.

Last term, the concepts of music were studied. This term, students are learning to play guitar, ukulele, keyboards and drums. We have also investigated music from many other countries throughout the world. At present students are focusing on the Orchestra and the Instruments of the Orchestra.

STAGE 4 MANDATORY TECHNOLOGY

Timber

The class completed several small projects including a fishing hand line, wooden pencil case with a steel lid, and a small note pad from recycled timber. For theory, the students have studied tools used when working with timber, the different characteristics of timber, different types of joins used, as well as the design process and project evaluation.

Metal

The students completed a number of small design projects, including a metal spinner, pencil holder and their own free choice project using copper sheet. For theory the students have studied the different characteristics of metals, the different types of metal fasteners and the different tools used when working with metal.


STAGE 5 INDUSTRIAL TECHNOLOGY METAL

During Semester 1, the students made several projects mainly using sheet metal. Some of the projects included a pencil holder, a punch rack, a screwdriver holder as well a small storage tray and a tool tray. They also completed an assessment task on one of their projects, which involved the student describing how they marked out, cut, folded and joined their project and the finishes they could use. During Term 4, the students started turning on the metal lathe and have already turned a small punch. The skills taught include parallel turning, taper turning, drilling and knurling.




CONSTRUCTION

PDHPE and Sports Studies



Stage 4 Personal Development, Health and Physical Education (PDHPE)

This year in PDHPE, students studied a range of topics in theory and practical. In theory, the main theme was risk, safety and support. We explored these through identifying risk and learning about risky behaviours such as drug use and bullying. Students also discovered a range of strategies to keep safe when in a risky situation, how to support themselves and people around them and how to apply First Aid.

During PE, the focus was on a variety of sports and games. Students participated in indoor games, striking and fielding and net and court games. Stage 4 finished off the year participating in water safety, where they developed their survival skills.





Stage 5 PDHPE

Students in Year 9 and 10 explored a variety of topics in both theory and practical. Students developed an understanding of physical activity, safe road use, health consumerism and diversity and discrimination.

During PE, students experienced a range of sports and games where they developed their physical skills and built upon their knowledge of game play. Students participated in recreational games, cultural games with a focus in indigenous games, different football codes, net and court and finally students refined their skills in athletics and participated in aquatic games.



Physical Activity and Sports Studies (PASS)

PASS students have explored a range of topics in both theory and practical. Students learnt about the body in motion - skeleton, muscles, cardiovascular and respiratory systems. We then explored drug use and nutrition in sport and the ethical issues behind their use. Students studied fitness and undertook fitness testing to assess their own fitness levels. We finished off learning about how to enhance performance through skills, techniques and strategies.



Sports Lifestyle and Recreation (SLR)

What a great year in Sports Lifestyle and Recreation! Students have participated in a range of activities. Students studied sport coaching, including what it takes to be an effective coach and developing their own coaching session. Students explored the components of a healthy lifestyle and the factors that influence lifestyle. They also completed research on particular health issues affecting young people. We finished off the year by learning all about First Aid and sports injuries. Students identified signs and symptoms of injuries and identified management and treatment for these.

Along with Yulu, families, friends and teaching staff joined the graduates at the Max Centre in Moree in what was a night of celebration for the 13 students graduating. From completing their HSC to receiving recognition for the completion of Industry based Training Certificates, to the very exciting news of university offers, it's fair to say that the students were able to walk away feeling proud, inspired and enthusiastic for a successful future.


